" EXERCISE TO A HEALTHIER LIFE STYLE"

I found this article in a new bulletin that is a follow up to my previous President's Message.

Why is it that people who exercise feel and look wonderful despite their age? There's a

growing amount of evidence indicating that the body ages faster when there is a lack of exercise. And if young athletic people are put on forced bed rest for 3 weeks, they lose 30% of their former level of fitness. This is fairly dramatic proof of what a sedentary life style does for a person.

Exercise also improves agility and keeps your muscles and joints more flexible. Exercise improves joint mobility for people with arthritis and helps diabetics control blood sugar levels. Blood pressure is easier to control with regular exercise.

"Anyone can exercise to some degree!" Be sure to check with your doctor as to an exercise program.

- 1. Select an activity you really enjoy
- 2. Get a complete physical from your doctor including an exercise stress test.
- 3. Always warm up, stretch out, and cool down to prevent injuries.

Some people feel that exercising alone can become boring, so try to exercise together with your mate. If you are single, try to join another or even a group. My wife and I enjoy doing our calisthenics in our home. We alternate in selecting each exercise. We also exercise in the morning before breakfast. The important thing to remember before exercising is to limber the muscles and body by stretching and starting the exercise routine very slowly.

BOARD OF RETIREMENT

NEW PROPOSED MEDICAL PLANS

In 1990 the Board of Retirement approved four new medical plans. But before they were approved by Los Angeles County the new plans were sent back to the Insurance and Benefits Committee for further consideration because of changes in the Medicare Laws.

After several months of study the Committee has again asked the Board of Retirement to approve the new plans. The original study was undertaken because of the Committee concern with the continued increase in the medical premiums and the fact that over 400 retired members are cancelling their LACERA medical plans each year because they can no longer afford the medical premiums. The following recommendations were to the Board.

Add to our present medical plans, F.H.P. Golden Health Care and Pacificare Secure Horizons. These plans are Medicare risk contracts as is the present Kaiser Health Pledge Plan. Start a new Provident Medical Plan #3 that would be a Medicare Supplement Indemnity Plan. LACERA retirees who have both Part A and B of Medicare and assigned Medicare to FHP, Pacificare, Kaiser Pledge or be enrolled in Provident #3, would then have their Medicare medical part "B" premiums paid by Los Angeles County. This would cover both the retiree and spouse. Also proposed is the addition of a Hospital PPO benefit to the Provident #2 medical plan which would provide a 90% reimbursement to Provident insured that use the approved PPO Hospitals. For those that elected to not use the offical PPO Hospitals the claims would be continued to be paid at 80%.

Since the new plans would be official LACERA Medical Plans, members who enroll in the new plans would be entitled to change medical plans with a six month notice back to one of our other LACERA Medical plans. Also our insured would have the protection of LACERA to help in any disputed claims.

For those LACERA members that have Medicare Part A and B coverage the new proposed medical plans will have a much lower premium. This should help those that have less than 25 years retirement credit with paying the medical premiums and being able to continue their medical coverage. On August 7, the Board of Retirement again approved the new plans, if Los Angeles County gives its approval the new medical plans would start on July 1, 1992. When and if the new plans are approved the Board of Retirement will send to all LACERA insured full information on enrollment. Please do not phone or write the LACERA or RELAC Staffs as they have no information at this time about the new plans.

660 CANCER AND CATASTROPHIC POLICY

During the past year several retired members have been asking me to see if there was any way to remove the 5-year limitation for payment of claims for any one illness that was covered under the Washington National Policy. Many of these retirees have had their illness continuously for over 5-years and therefore were no longer covered for that one illness. I asked Washington National Insurance Co. and 660 Benefits Director, Marylin Lundstrom, to try and remove the 5-year limit. Happy to say, Marylin was successful! So on July 1, 1991 this 5-Year limit was removed and any covered medical claims for treatment after July 1, should be paid. Members will not be paid retroactively, however, if the limit has already elapsed for the five years before July 1, 1991. Also, many other benefits under this policy have been increased, and doubled in some areas of coverage. The daily hospital-income benefits for any qualified policy-covered illness will go up from \$40.00 to \$80.00 for the first 30 days, and after that, \$30.00 a day up to a maximum of \$20,000 per claim. The maximum total policy coverage is now \$500,000. There are many other increased benefits. Those that are insured should receive an official notice from 660 in the future. We should thank Marylin Lundstrom for her very good efforts in negotiating this much better coverage and the cancellation of the 5-year limitation. There will be no increase in the premium for anyone covered by the policy.

Frightened by the savings and loan fiasco, junk-bond scams and problems at some commercial banks and insurance companies, millions of Americans are wondering just where their money is secure. "Safer" options exist, but in general, the bigger the reward, the bigger the risk.

Bank Accounts	Among the safest havens. Americans have deposited \$3.5 trillion in savings accounts. Nearly all are federally insured up to \$100,000 per account. UPDATE ON STAR COLA

Reference is made to the last three issues of the RELAC Newsletter as pertains to the current status of our most precious "STAR COLA" program. We write this jointly so as to insure you of the mutual concern and interest of both the Investments Board and the Retirement Board as to what is going on and the prospects of a continuance of the "STAR" program.

As you so well know, the program is totally dependent on the availability of excess earnings and the annual renewal recommendations of both Boards. Under such circumstances one can not count on a full renewal or partial renewal and therefore should not obligate themselves for any long term financial commitments that are dependent upon the "STAR COLA" program.

Our projections are that the program can be funded for 1992 at the current rates,

but without funds being added to the reserve during 1992, there can be no assurance for 1993. In this month of September, the Investments Board will be making a full financial analysis of the current status of the fund to determine the ability to add any additional funds to the reserve. These findings and a recommendation will be made to the Retirement Board who shall make the decision as to the amount of bonus for 1992 with the added knowledge of projection for 1993.

All this is related to projected excess earnings and the disappointing fiscal year (July 1, 1990–June 30, 1991). Although not overly optimistic, one can see the world recovery from the economic doldrums and with the absence of any major world conflicts, 1992 should be a better year and the "STAR" program will continue to provide the benefits to each and every one of you.

INVESTMENT BOARD REDUCES COST

At its meeting of July 24, the Investments Board took unanimous action to recommend to the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County, that the setting of the Assumption Rate continue at 8% and the Crediting Rate be reduced to 7%.

The Assumption Rate is the projected rate of return on the investments of the fund for the next fiscal year. The board has strong feelings that such rates should be projected on a long term basis and not subjected to slight fluctuations in the market. The 8% rate has been in effect for a full seven years.

The Crediting Rate is the rate of interest added to active county employees retirement accounts during their

employment years with the county. Do you remember? You received this report every year while you were working.

The Crediting Rate has been identical to the Assumption Rate in prior years and was credited at 8% last year. The only concern of this rate is those active employees who contemplate leaving the county and withdrawing their retirement funds. This is their contributions plus interest. The recommended reduction from 8% to 7% is thought to be fair in comparison with, if not better, than any private account in a bank or savings and loan. This likewise affects only those few who contemplate departure from the county. This reduction of costs to the fund obviously helps the overall position of the fund.

HOT TAMALE CASSEROLE

1/2 lb Pork Sausage

1 lb Ground Beef (lean)

(I use all beef instead of pork sausage)

1 Onion

1 Clove Garlic

1-2 1/2 can tomatoes

1 tsp salt or less

2 tsp chili powder

3/4 C Corn Meal

1 1/2 C Ripe Olives

2 C Sliced Celery

1 Can Kernal Corn (don't drain)

1 1/2 C Chedder Cheese grated

Cook sausage till lightly brown, drain, add beef and cook and stir till browned—add garlic, onion and celery, cook until onion is transparent—add tomatoes, corn, salt, chile and boil slowly about 15 minutes. Slowly stir in the Cornmeal and cook until its thickened, stir in olives—turn into greased 2 qt casserole and top with cheese. Bake 350° about 45 minutes. Freezes well if cold bring to room temperature before baking.

WHAT HAPPENED IN SACRAMENTO?

Many of you have attempted to keep pace with what was going on in Sacramento as relates to the various public pension plans. All that's happened was in the dead of night and was all related to the **State Employees Retirement Plan**.

RELAC, in its continuous efforts to keep you abreast of what's going on, contacted Mr. Dave Cox, a private consultant and former staff employee of the California Legislature, to offer us an evaluation of what happened and the possible long-term effects it may have on our 1937 Retirement Act.

AB702, which is now law, and **only** effects the **state retirement**, is a bit involved but we are sure you can digest the results and the trend as established. The last paragraph of Mr. Cox's letter refers to the **California Retired Employees Association** of which **RELAC** is a member is already intensely involved in the full ramification of AB702 and any spill-overs as may affect the 37 Act.

IS THERE A AB 702 IN YOUR FUTURE?

AB 702 (Frizzelle), Chapter 83, Statutes of 1991, was signed into law on June 30 of this year.

The measure makes substantial changes in the Public Employees' Retirement Law (PERS), the Public Employees' Medical and Hospital Care Act (PEMHCA), and the State Teachers' Retirement Law (STRS). In the opinion of many, these changes could have a negative impact on active and retired members of PERS and STRS, as well as active and retired employees participating in PEMHCA.

It is also possible that the measure may have an impact on the health and retirement benefits of members participating in retirement systems operating under the provisions of the County Retirement Law of 1937 (37 Act Systems).

How? By establishing certain precedents that might be attractive to 37 Act County Board of Supervisors or other entities that might desire to reduce benefits or gain a greater degree of control over the administration of a 37 Act retirement system. While a major change in the structure of a 37 act county retirement system would most probably require a change in 37 Act Law, it should be noted that AB 702, an urgency measure, passed through the legislature in less than one week, and by a 56 to 18 vote in the Assembly and a 27 to 12 vote in the Senate.

Provisions contained in AB 702 which may be of interest include:

Health Care

1. AB 702 amended the Public Employees' Medical and Hospital Care Act (PEMHCA) to provide that the state employers' contribution towards the health care coverage of state employees covered by bargaining units shall be determined by an MOU.

This change in PEMHCA will have serious implications for retired state employees. Prior to AB 702, all state employees, active and retired, were treated as a single group, entitled to the same employer contribution (set by law), and the same health care benefits. Making the employers' contribution towards the health care of active employees subject to collective bargaining is the first step toward separating active and retired members into separate experience groups for determining health care costs, and eventually into separate health care programs. Although eligible, no 37 Act county participates in PEMHCA at this time. Regardless, PEMHCA has always been considered a model health care plan that guarantees equal health care protection to both active and retired public employees. As a result of AB 702, this no longer will be true.

Retirement

- 1. AB 702 authorizes the Governor, rather than the PERS Board of Administration, to choose the system's actuary. The actuary will be paid by the system, is defined as a fiduciary, and will be responsible for performing all actuarial determinations for PERS, including setting the employer retirement contribution rates.
- 2. The measure repeals the PERS IDDA/EPDA cost-of-living programs, which provided a purchasing power guarantee of up to 80 percent, paid from excess returns on investments.
- 3. The bill provides that all of the money now in the IDDA/EPDA accounts (in excess of \$1.6 billion) shall be used to reduce employer retirement contributions.
- 4. AB 702 replaces the IDDA/EPDA programs with a "targeted" 75 percent purchasing power guarantee program to be funded from 1.1 percent of the net earnings on member contributions.
- 5. The bill permits the state's PERS contributions for the 1991-92 fiscal year to be made semi-annually, rather than quarterly.
- 6. The measure provides that the state will make quarterly (rather than monthly) payments to the State Teacher' Retirement Fund to help eliminate that system's existing unfunded liability.

In essence, the provisions of AB 702 reflected above would appear to be saying that it is O.K. to use "surplus" retirement funds to reduce the employer's contributions towards retirement and that the employer should determine the amount of retirement contributions to be made, as well as the frequency of those payments. In other words, it is the employer, rather than the retirement system, who knows how to best determine and administer the retirement benefits of its employees.

In addition, if the Governor (the employer) is given the authority to make all actuarial determinations, why not extend to the employer additional authority such as the right to choose the system's chief legal counsel, investment officer, or chief executive officer?

The California Retired County Employees Association should closely follow the implementation of AB 702, and guard against any "spinoff" legislation that might try to make similar changes in the County Retirement Law of 1937.

The summer has rapidly drawn to a close with LACERA fine-tuning the new computer system to eliminate the major problems of the payroll conversion.

As we draw a proverbial breath of air, attention can wander to other areas of concern.

In the area of insurance coverage we have found four problem areas:

The first problem relates to minor children who reach their majority, but the member continues to pay a premium even though the child is no longer eligible for coverage. Our literature in the insurance enrollment package specifically states that it is the member's responsibility to remove dependents who are no longer eligible. LACERA will refund (1) year only for overpaid premiums. With respect to your children, you must notify us when they reach age 18, and if still enrolled full-time in school, provide a statement from their school each semester showing that the child is fully enrolled, (12 units or more). When the child finishes college or attains age 22, it is your responsibility to remove the child from your plan.

The second problem area is with eligible spouses. As time goes by we may lose a spouse who we have named as beneficiary. It's your responsibility to provide us with the information of the death of that spouse. You also may wish to name a new beneficiary for the \$750.00 death benefit from your account at that time.

If you lose a spouse through divorce, remember that our policies specifically exclude ex-spouses from coverage.

Remember insurance costs are impressive, but each little bit can help reduce overall costs.

A third issue applies to the addition of new dependents.

If you marry after retirement you have 30 days in which to enroll a new spouse in our plan. You must submit a copy of the marriage document. If you have a new child, again within 30 days, we need a copy of the birth certificate.

A fourth issue relates to moving out of the HMO servicing areas. Should this occur, and you wish to continue with LACERA's plans you need to contact us for information on plans that will cover you in the new area.
